What's so unique about his music? Well, he's 70 years old, was the music composer for the legendary Broadway hit "Hair," and relates to the hip hop generation, summing up its power by saying, "Hip hop saved the R&B feel—it gave another life to it." Everyone from the Beastie Boys to Prince Paul continues to utilize his compositions. Now that's dope.

POLARITY/Norman
Stuck Under the Needle

Barfly & Onry Ozzborn (of Seattle's Oldminion crew) are a thread from the fabric of hip hop—although you find them more at the DC/Circa cuts than the Burberry/Sean Jean. "Norman" is the equivalent to Eminem's "Stan," where Norman is the "Misguided kid from suburbia who thinks he's Tupac. He's the kid who always gets clowned at school." This is one of those albums that runs unaffected by commercialized trends that dictate what styles should be. Check out the unheard-of use of crowd chants from a U.K. football game on "Weastwick United F.C." Then check the lyrics on "Hip Hop.Ver1.7" that go, "You're Hip Hop's your Hova. Mine's Allah. Lets make this trivial bullshit into a holy war. We're just a bunch of bad, fucked-up rappers anyway. You're the sperm donor—we raised your kid. Where the fuck you been? Practicing and

Well it wasn't until '01 when folks got a full length from them and, soon after, the most recent album "Dangerous Connection," which includes appearances by J-Live, CountBass D and Apathy, to name a few. But just because they have skills in music and they can rock a show doesn't mean that we like them—remember they're Patriot fans!
